

## A WEDDING WITHOUT GUESTS (December 27, 1941)

Listen, our children, and you shall now hear of the strange romance of your parents dear.

'Twas in the summer of nineteen hundred and thirty-five that their sweet love stony first came alive.

In psychology class he first saw her sweet smile, but to find out her name would take him a while.

Leo listened intently as she answered roll call,

But his pals bet him loudly he'd not rate at all.

Tom, Wayne, and Guy then conjured up a bet

That a date with "Miss Avery" he never would get.

Her landlady grew increasingly tired of answering the phone,

For it took seven calls ere he could find her at home.

'Twas the twenty-seventh of June, a most special date;

1941 THROUGH THE YEARS WITH LEO AND ETHEL 1991

We have lived in many places and moved 13 times. Let's reminisce! Can you place in this review the times and places where our lives touched?

December 1941 - During the turmoil following Pearl Harbor Day, Dec. 7, 1941, Leo and Ethel were married in CHICAGO, as Ethel was working there. Leo was elementary principal at WESTMORELAND, KS.

1942-44 - In May Ethel and his Mom joined him in WESTMORELAND. During the summer Ethel supervised a Pott. Co. mattress-making project and Leo worked in the Burlington RR shops in LINCOLN, NE. In September little DARRYL RAY was born at home, but in November it was Leo who was hospitalized with appendicitis. In addition to his school, Leo "moonlighted" working in Green's Grocery and running the township road maintainer. In March Ethel became a County Social Welfare home visitor. In August 1943 Leo's sister Lois, her husband Norman Lull, and 7-year-old Patty joined the family, until their farm in Washington county would be available the next March. In April 1944 Leo volunteered for the Navy but was later released due to lung scarring.

1944-46 - Leo accepted the principalship in FRANKFORT, where they moved into the Presbyterian Manse, and Ethel commuted to her Westmoreland job. Leo continued working toward his K-State degree with correspondence and summer school, moonlighting with refereeing sports and checking Fox Theatre attendance all over NE Kansas. Leo completed his 3rd

degree Masonic work in May 1946.

1946-48 - In the fall of 1946 the family moved to ELLINWOOD, KS, then later to a high school principalship at CLEBURNE. On Jan. 1, Leo's brother-in-law Chet Peeples died suddenly and his sister Alma and 7-year-old Marshall joined the family for a few months. Feb. 12 Ethel's mother died; the following day daughter GWENDA LYNN was born. By summer Alma had moved to Lincoln, taking Mother G. and Marshall with Ethel went back to work at "Westy", with Opal Pickett the babysitter with the two little ones.

1948-51 - During the summer of 1948, Leo and Ethel moved to CIRCLEVILLE High School jobs, taking Opal along until she married, then Leta Holt and Doris Fernkopf were the sitters. In Jan. 1949 Mother G. passed away in Lincoln. During the summer Leo tried a stint at soap selling with his brother Carl in DAVENPORT, IA but returned to Circleville to remodel their home there. Dad Avery came to visit and in Dec. he suffered a stroke, later passing away in the Holton hospital. Leo and Ethel joined Eastern Star and Leo transferred his Masonic member-of 1950 Leo bought an Indian pinto "Champ" for Darryl, was continuing with his refereeing, was coaching, and playing softball.

1951-54 - In the spring of 1951 Leo resigned his school job to buy the local grocery and locker plant. On Oct. 4 a 2nd son ARTHUR CLARK was born. Later they sold the house and moved into the apartment adjoining the store. Leo pitched softball with the Holton Flyers, having thrilling games, was butchering up to 16 beeves a day, raising baby

chicks, selling eggs and dressed chickens in Manhattan, while commuting to work on his Master's degree. No wonder he was having health problems! In August 1953 Ethel went back to Westy to fill in on the SW director's vacation; little LOIS LYNETTE was born Sept. 11

1954-56 - In March 1954 Ethel went back to work in Pott. Co, SW, commuting with AC and Lois, staying in Opal Taylor's apartment during the week. Still working on his Master's during the summer Leo signed to be elementary principal at ONAGA. After the family moved into the Marjorie JENKINS house there, he turned the store over to his help, Roy Daugherty and Wanda Fernkopf. Ethel was teaching at White Pigeon rural school while Leta(Holt) Kocher babysat. Darryl was in Scouting, 4-H, and school band. Later Mrs. Vera "Grandma" Witham came to babysit. In 1955 Leo completed his Master's from KSU. His grade school BB team won the County tourney. In May 1956 the Jenkins house caught fire, and the family moved back to the CIRCLEVILLE apartment, where Ethel had signed to her former HE-English job. July 1 the store sold, and the family left on a 5-week trip through the East, then moving back to the Dave Clark house in ONAGA, Ethel commuting to Circleville.

1956-65 - Leo and Leonard Ottman built a "teardrop" trailer for future trips; Ethel began working on library training hours and teaching English in the Onaga High School. Gwen won the talent show and resumed ballet lessons in Manhattan. Darryl, who had been working summers on his Uncle Albion's farm, earned a Bel Aire Chevie. In 1958 the family took a memorable trip to the West Coast...In Jan. 1959 Leo's school building collapsed and classes were held all over town while plans

were begun for a new building. In Jan 1960 Ethel gave up her high school job, as 3rd son LEO BRADLEY was born March 5. In June the family purchased the DUNN house. Leo was Lions Club president. In the fall Darryl was off to K-State, and Ethel began teaching in the Jr. High...In 1961 Leo received State Commendation on his outstanding music and physical education programs in the new building. Gwen won the Co. 4-H style revue...In 1962 Darryl took Marine basic training at Quantico, VA, and the family with Linda Jones had a holiday in TN.... In 1963 Leo and Ethel, as well as Gwen and AC, were in summer school at Emporia, while Lois and "Little Leo" were at Aunt Esther's. Darryl and Linda announced their engagement. Gwen received a Gold 4-H Achieve ment award...In 1964 Darryl and Linda were married on Ethel's birthday and as soon as Darryl received his BS from K-State they were off Regional Library system.

1965-1966 - Unification of school systems caused upheaval, and Leo signed a superintendency at FOWLER, KS in Meade Co. and Ethel was h.s. lib-rarian and English. Gwen was a freshman at Emporia State.

1966-1980 - In Jan. 1966 Leo accepted consultant position with the State Department of Education, moving the family to TOPEKA during the June 6 Tornado week. July 2 Little Natalie Rae was born to Darryl and Linda. In August Ethel completed her Master's at E-State and became teacherlibrarian in Topeka's Dist. #501. AC and Lois finished high school at Shawnee Heights near Topeka, taking honors in scholarship, forenics, and music. AC received a Baker U. Presidential scholarship, spent one year studying in Germany, and finished at KU in 1973. Lois finished in 1975 at Emporia and began teaching sneech and debate at Wichita North High.

In 1975, Leo had his first heart bypass surgery at St. Luke's in KC on Feb. 14, returned to the Office, but had 5 more bypasses in 1978 on March 23, Gwen's 10th wedding anniversary(she was married to Gene Eidman in 1968, graduated from E-State in 1969, and was mother of 3: Donal James born in 1971, Julie Jo in 1974, and Clinton Gregory in 1977). Leo retired, and Brad graduated from Shawnee Heights and enrolled at KU. 1980 - Feb. 6 Leo had a severe heart attack, closing off 3 of his 6 bypasses; Ethel finished a history of the Highland Park community, where she had been teacher-librarian for the past 14 years, retired, and they turned their Topeka home over to Brad. In their Open Road motor home, Leo and Ethel started out to the Southwest, settled upon Yuma, AZ as the most healthful climate for Leo, but take many trips to Good Sam Samborees and enjoy companionship of other "Second Chance Sams." In 1981 Janelle Renee Eidman was born, and Brad and Terri Lynn Pound were married and lived in the Topeka home until 1984 when Brad transferred to Providence, RI. A tornado took the house May 6, 1983 but it was rebuilt and sold in 1986, after Leo had bought in Kenyon Mobile Home Park in Yuma, where they enjoy the pool, jacuzzi, and social life with friends from all over the USA. In addition to his trips in their Pace Arrow motor home, Leo takes pride in his "punch embroidered" jackets he has placed all over the world and watching TV sports. Ethel is ever busy with sewing and crafts, family history projects, and keeping in touch with old friends like you. Keep in touch! LOIS LYNETTE GRIFFING, b 11 Sep 1953, graduate Shawnee Hgts. HS 1971, E-State 1975, taught speech and debate in Wichita high schools for 7 years, now a professional stage manager at the renowned Goodman

Theatre in Chicago, IL.
